

Dear Director and Board Members:

In accordance with provisions of Section 2279 of the California Agricultural Code, I hereby submit the 1981 El Dorado County Crop Report.

The gross agricultural value is approximately \$34 million, a decrease of \$14 million from the high gross income reported in 1979. The primary reason for this decrease is that the timber industry has elected not to harvest as much timber because of a depressed economy. Purchasers of national forest timber are allowed five years from time of purchase to harvest their timber.

The County's grape industry is expanding at an increasing rate. El Dorado County, and her sister Sierra foothill counties, are rapidly becoming known as premium wine grape growing areas. Eight wineries are presently in operation in the County -- an increase of three from that reported in 1980. These wineries and their tasting rooms are extremely complementary to the County's ranch marketing program, and are blending extremely well with other recreational and agricultural industries in the County.

Cherries and late season plums are beginning to attract more attention in El Dorado County. Both of these crops will be planted more extensively within the next five years. Specialty crops such as blueberries, boysenberries and peaches will be expanding on a limited basis in order for growers to extend their ranch marketing programs into the late spring and early summer season. Again, all of these crops will be complementary to the agricultural industries presently in the ranch marketing program.
